The Patriot Battalion cadets returned from winter break ready to hit the ground running and build upon the progress made in the fall. The fall semester focused on the basics of Army tactics and leadership, by conducting squad level tactics and soldiering skills. By spring, it was the time for our Cadets to take it to the next level. The MSIIIs assumed platoon leader, platoon sergeant, and squad leader roles in platoon patrolling operations, with MSIs and MSIs filling in as lower enlisted. While there were many questions and learning moments early on, LLABs 1-7 (which included patrolling, OPORD briefs, patrol base classes and more) helped get all MSIII's ready for CST. All of these skills were *really* put to the test at our culminating CFTX (Combined Field Training Exercise) with URI's Cramer's Sabers. At the CFTX, cadets also sharpened their land navigation skills (day and night), conducted Alt C, and believe it or not, completed more platoon patrolling operations. But that was not the end of it for the MSIII's, as the closing weeks of the semester provided even MORE platoon patrolling labs. We have done our best to ensure that every MSIII is ready to rock at CST. MSIIs beware, you are next...

Norwegian Foot March

On 29 April 2023, 19 Cadets traveled to Chelmsford, MA and participated in the Norwegian Foot March hosted by the Boston Army Medical Recruiting Station and the 804th Medical Brigade. The event was hosted to help shed light on the need for medical providers both in the military and civilian medical communities as they are experiencing significant shortages throughout the country.

Each participant was required to complete the 18.6 mile ruck within a pre-determined time based on gender and age while carrying 24lbs of can goods. A total of 92 participants took part in the march and 66 successfully finished the ruck; an impressive 2,150lbs of canned goods were collected and donated to benefit the greater Boston area.

CPT Marshall, event organizer, gave a shout out to the Patriot Battalion highlighting two of our Cadets "I also wanted to highlight the fastest male and female of the march and wish them congratulations on their hard work! I don't know what they are putting in the water down there in Rhode Island, but the Patriot Battalion ROTC of Providence College had a clean sweep."
