As it occurs every spring semester, the cadets of Patriot Battalion returned from winter break ready to hit the ground running and build upon the technical and tactical skills they learned during the previous fall semester. The spring semester brings added pressure for the MSIIIs as the reality of performing well and getting solid evaluations at Cadet Summer Training (CST) or Advance Camp (AC) looms over them. The fall semester focused on the basics of Army tactics and leadership by conducting squad level tactics and soldiering skills. This spring, it was the time for the MSIIIs to take it to the next level. They assumed platoon leader, platoon sergeant, and squad leader roles in platoon patrolling operations, with MSIs and MSIIs filling in as lower enlisted. While there were many questions and learning moments early on, LLABs 1-7 (which included patrolling, OPORD briefs, patrol base classes and more) helped get all MSIIIs ready for CST. All of these skills were really put to the test during our culminating Combined Field Training Exercise (CFTX) which occurred between five schools to include Northeastern University, Boston University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, University of Rhode Island and of course Providence College. There were over 300 cadets on ground at Camp Edwards, MA training and enhancing their skills over the four day CFTX, which simulated that of Advance Camp for the MSIIIs and Basic Camp for the MSIs and MSIs. The CFTX started off with everyone conducting Night into Day Land Navigation, once complete, the MSIIIs from all five schools worked through STX lanes together just as they would during CST while the MSIs and MSIIs rotated through various stations including Battle Drills, Weapons Training, Medical and Communications, the Leaders Reaction Course, the Obstacle Course, and the Rappel Course. The MSIs and MSIIs finished the CFTX with a six mile ruck march and the MSIIIs from PC went to the range for familiarization on the new qualification table. But that was not the end of it for the MSIIIs, as the closing weeks of the semester provided even MORE platoon patrolling labs. As MSIVs we have done our best to ensure that every MSIII is ready to rock at CST. MSIIIs, we are excited to pass you the MSIV torch and entrust you will train, educate and prepare the rising MSIIIs to an even higher standard.

Patriot Battalion ROTC Cadets Making an Impact

Community service has always been an integral part of how the Patriot Battalion operates. Engaging in activities that benefit the community allows cadets to apply the values they learn in training to real-world scenarios, fostering a deeper understanding of service and sacrifice.

Through volunteering, cadets build strong bonds with the community that are essential to their development as leaders. Starting in January, the Patriot Battalion was invited to assist with several JROTC color guard competitions. With newfound relationships fostered at these events, later in the semester, two groups of cadets assisted the JROTC Raider Challenge cadets in training for the competition. Other events include recruiting on our own campuses, serving dinner at St. Mary's House, and participating in Valentines for Veterans.

Thirty-one cadets participated in 15 volunteer events for a total of roughly 300 hours of community service. After each volunteer event, cadets always leave with a warmth in their hearts, knowing they have brightened someone's day. In the end, it is moments like these that remind cadets why they felt the call to service.



SSG Suryawan Ang was born in Jakarta, Indonesia and raised in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. He enlisted in the United States Army in 2015 as a 68W, Combat Medic, and attended basic training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma and Advanced Individual Training at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. He was selected for the Green to Gold ADO program and is currently enrolled in Brown University while participating in ROTC with the Patriot Battalion at Providence College, Rhode Island. He is projected to commission in May 2025.

He is a graduate of the Basic Leaders Course, the Advanced Leaders Course, certified SHARP Victim's Advocate, Army retention NCO, and Unit Prevention Leader. He possesses an Associate's of Science in Business Administration from Pennsylvania State University.

SSG Ang's assignments include: Health Care Specialist, 25th Infantry Division, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii and Non-Commissioned Officer In Charge, Emergency Department, Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, Germany.

His awards and decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal, the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Achievement Medal (5 Awards), Army Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Armed Forces Service Medal, Humanitarian Service Medal (2 Awards), Overseas Service Ribbon (2 Awards), Non-Commissioned Officer Professional Development Ribbon, Driver Badge and Air Assault Badge.

In 2021, SSG Ang played a crucial role in Operation Allies Refuge (OAR). Serving as the Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge (NCOIC) of the Emergency Department in Landstuhl, he effectively led his team in providing emergency medical care for 988 Afghan nationals within a condensed timeframe of 20 days.

Cadet Ang served as the Cadet First Sergeant in Spring 2024 and is poised to assume the role of Cadet Company Commander in Fall 2024. Additionally, he was presented with the Army ROTC Superior Cadet Decoration Award for having been selected as the outstanding cadet in his class for the academic year 2024.

Presented to a Providence College Cadet who has been selected for Active Duty and will commission into either the Infantry or Combat Arms branch, and displays and extraordinary level of loyalty, duty, selflessness, and a general love for Military Service. Awarded to *John McNicholas and Luke Tischio, both from Providence College*.

The Providence College COL J. Gardner Conway Alumni Award

COL Conway enlisted in the Rhode Island National Guard in 1931 and served in the South Pacific during World War II. He was a member of the 1/103rd Field Artillery. COL Conway committed himself to numerous military, Providence College and civic affairs. His life positively influenced many great organizations. In 1989, COL Conway received the Mal Brown Award from the Greater Providence Chapter of the Providence College Alumni Association. The award is the highest accolade given to PC Alumni "whose lives have exemplified the love and loyalty for PC that was characteristic of Mal Brown." "Presented to a superior Providence College Cadet who has achieved the highest standing in terms of military attitude, moral character, holistic achievement, and leadership potential; ultimately typifying the honor and humanity of COL J.
